- English Literature researchers from four UK universities
- Thematic analysis of the dataset (Braun & Clarke, 2022)
- Limitations: small sample size, recording issues

"Prestige is a big issue because it's not *just* prestige. It's not snobbery. It's that it's linked to some kind of quality guarantee." (Victorianist 2).

"Chiefly in the scholarly community for sure. But it is quite an interdisciplinary audience [...] other disciplines looking at relationships between print and/or technology and broader culture." (Modernist 1).

"[...] it's part of the scholarly imperative to make the materials that I use available as widely as possible, or at least as available to the specialised community that I publish for, so that they can see what I'm looking at." (Modernist 1).

"I think there's been a big change in the REF as well in that there's been more emphasis on higher quality publications rather than lots of kind of like less high-quality publications." (Modernist 3).

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"I notice with more senior colleagues [...] they might do less narrow, like traditionally academic forms of writing, when they have a bit more kind of security." (Modernist 3).



Career development

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"... we'll be kind of looking at a hybrid ecology of scholarly outputs going forward, and it's gonna be messy and quite unresolved for a number of years. [...] It's a really tough one - because you need to get the money somehow. That circle still needs to be squared" (Modernist 1).
